City Council Highlights—May 12, 2021

Mayor Sturman, John Brasier, Johnalee McDonald, Tyrell Maughan, and Larry Gilmore were present. Mayor Sturman called the meeting to order at 7:30 P.M. and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

POLICE REPORT – Chief Fullmer reported 166 patrol hours; 6 overtime hours; 2 callouts; 0 arrest/warrant; 31 traffic stops; 16 traffic citations issued; 0 non-traffic citation issued; 32 incidents responded to; 0 special events attended; 2 special patrol/vacation watch; 3 animal control; 1 medical calls. Ucon Elementary Bike Ride will be held on Wednesday, May 19th at 9 AM. The council unanimously voted to sell the non-running 2008 Taurus X for scrap. FIRE REPORT - Chief Scott Norman reported 22 members, 18 attending regular training, and two wildland members. 135 training hours; 78 chief hours; 82 hours on 3 calls to Ammon; 2 calls in Ucon (ditch bank fires); 3 Jefferson County assists; 1 USWIG fire in Firth; 120 hours maintenance; 0 wildland hours; 415 total hours. The department finished their annual wildland RT130 training. They are still working on the HEMTT. Chief Norman requested and received approval to spend \$4,200 from wildland funds to repair the pump on the Kenworth tender and purchase three collapsible water tanks for the wildland fire trucks. He informed the Council that he signed the BLM-Forest Service agreement. The only changes to the agreement were radio frequencies. The council unanimously voted to excess the Humvee via public auction. LANDSCAPE & REC COMMITTEE REPORT - Tyrell Maughan stated that he will get trees for the park to be planted on Saturday, May 15th at Arbor Day and City Cleanup. Mayor Sturman stated that the Ucon Elementary field trip to the City Offices will be held on Tuesday, June 1st at 9 AM.

PUBLIC WORKS REPORT – Daniel Morgan that a s small water leak was repaired on 109 N. Sewers will be jetted this summer. The sewer line at Simmons Park restroom was jetted due to a huge blockage with rocks, etc. He stated that this is the last time they will work on the bathrooms; if it happens again the bathrooms will be locked for good. They are repainting the dugout benches at the baseball diamond to try to make them last a few more years. The Ucon Baseball association is purchasing new bases. Daniel presented estimates for the paving of the city building parking lot Bids were received from

HK Contractors - \$35,450; DePatco: \$36,450; and Thompson Paving: \$42,062. The council unanimously voted to accept the HK Contractors bid for \$35,450. Daniel stated that the concrete curbing will be installed and potholes will be patched next week. Mayor Sturman stated that the GIS equipment has been received. Once it is set up the infrastructure mapping can be done.

WATER & SEWER SYSTEM REPORT – John Brasier reported 3,330,000 gallons sent to Idaho Falls sewer for April. This number will go up to 5 million gallons now that water is in the ditch. He stated that he and Mayor Sturman met with Chris Canfield from the City of Idaho Falls sewer department regarding the renewal of the sewer agreement. There will an increase in sewer rates. They requested that the rate increases be spread over a few years instead of all at once and are awaiting an answer from Mr. Canfield. Idaho Falls has requested a portion of each new connection fee. Mayor Sturman stated that in researching other cities our connect fees are extremely low.

RYAN LOFTUS RE: SEWER CAPACITY STUDY – Ryan Loftus presented a proposal for \$6,840 to perform a sewer force main capacity study. Mayor Sturman asked him to conduct a study of sewer connect fees as well. The council unanimously voted to approve up to \$25,000 for sewer capacity and connection fees studies.

LOTT PROPERTY ANNEXATION REQUEST – Mayor Sturman stated that he was approached again about annexing the Lott property south of 97th North. He stated the since the property is not in Ucon's impact zone and the property cannot be served with water or sewer, annexing the property would not benefit the city. He also does not want to leave a strip of homes outside the city limits.

ALLOW CHICKENS IN R1 ZONE – Sally Lewis asked about the progress of the ordinance amendments to allow chickens in the R1 Zone. Mayor Sturman assured her that they are in the process of being amended.

COMMUNITY PARADE – Kriss Pond and Sally Lewis stated that they have many great ideas for having a parade on Founders Day. They will work with Johnalee McDonald to plan the event

BMPO REPORT – Larry Gilmore stated that the city will be receiving a bill for 1.1% local match for BMPO. The I-15 and US-20 projects are on track for July. Most bigger projects have been pushed to 2026.

Assistance for persons with disabilities will be provided - contact the City Clerk at least 24 hours prior to the hearing.

Please be aware of the following requirements per Ucon Ordinance 18-110

- ALL dogs must be licensed—purchase tags @ City Building
- Have more than two (2) dogs? Kennel license required
- Dogs must be kept on your property at all times or on a leash when off your property
- Dogs running loose may be impounded



A Message from Chief Fullmer

It's that time of the year again when the city asks everyone to do their part to help keep Ucon a safe and pleasant place to live. Just a reminder that weeds/grass cannot exceed 10" and property owners are responsible for maintaining the rights-of- way adjacent to their properties (including ditch banks).

A common beautification complaint we receive is for unused or "junk" vehicles in yards. I understand that "one man's junk is another man's treasure"; however, the storage of unused/junk vehicles in residential zones is prohibited by ordinance. I get it, vehicles break down and need fixed, and for some, it's a hobby, generally this is not an issue, it becomes an issue when vehicles begin to accumulate and sit for years, causing a nuisance. Junk and unused vehicles should be removed or stored completely out of public view.

Lastly, if you have an alley behind your property, please check to make sure that you don't have any tree branches or bushes, etc. overhanging that could impede access to the alley. It is important to keep the alleys clear for fire protection and other vital services.

Starting the first week of June I will start handing out notices for the previously mentioned issues. As always I prefer to work with people before issuing any citations so if you have any questions or if the City of Ucon can reasonably help, please don't hesitate to ask.
