City Council Highlights July 11th Special Meeting

The council tentatively approved the FY22 Budget. July 14—Regular City Council Meeting

Mayor Sturman, John Brasier, Johnalee McDonald, Tyrell Maughan-late 736, and Larry Gilmore, and no citizens were present.

Mayor Sturman called the meeting to order at 7:32 P.M. and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

POLICE REPORT – Chief Fullmer reported 164 patrol hours; 4 overtime hours; 4 callouts; 2 arrest/warrant; 34 traffic stops; 24 traffic citations issued; 28 incidents responded to; 2 special patrol/vacation watch; 2 animal control calls; 2 medical calls. He stated there were not many problems on the 4th of July. He stated that the 4th of July Breakfast was a blast and he appreciates everything the Fire Department does. He has applied for a grant for radios which may require a match. FIRE REPORT – Chief Scott Norman reported 22 members, 18 attending regular training, and five wildland members. 180 training hours; 92 chief hours; 105 hours on 7 calls to Ammon (3 canceled enroute; 1 house fire; 3 field fires); 0 calls in Ucon; 1 call to Rigby-assist with house fire; 8 total calls; 215 hours maintenance; 460 wildland hours; 960 total hours. The department assisted Ammon with their fireworks patrol. The department is currently working on their sixth wildland resource order and have turned down twelve so far this year. The Kenworth is in Salmon and the 5ton is in Ely, NV. The 32nd annual Fourth of July breakfast was a success as always. He expressed his appreciation to Daniel, Josh, and Jake for their help. He and Chief Fullmer applied for a Homeland Security grant for just under \$46,000 for ten radios. The grant may require up to a 25% match which will come out of wildland funds. He thanked the council for their support.

LANDSCAPE & REC COMMITTEE REPORT – Tyrell Maughan stated that the June yard of the month is Travis & Abigail Hull at 10736 N 42 E. Johnalee McDonald reported that she is working hard on Founders' Day.

PUBLIC WORKS REPORT – Daniel Morgan reported that water is going well. The Tower Road lift station was cleaned and looks good. He requested and received approval for \$20,000 for new impellers and wear plates for the four Flygt pumps and \$15,000 to replace the riding mower and push mower. Mayor Sturman stated that the GIS equipment is up and running and all the infrastructure assets should be mapped by fall.

WATER & SEWER SYSTEM REPORT – John Brasier reported that the sewer flow rate was 4.1 million gallons for June.

BMPO REPORT – Larry Gilmore reported that a phone meeting was held on June 23^{rd} . Council meeting adjourned at 8:38 P.M. Resolution No. 68

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF UCON, IDAHO RE-SERVING THE FORGONE AMOUNT FOR FISCAL YEAR 2022 FOR POTENTIAL USE IN SUBSEQUENT YEARS AS DESCRIBED IN IDAHO CODE §63-802, et al. WHEREAS, Idaho Code §50-235 empowers the city council of each city to levy taxes for general revenue purposes; and, WHEREAS, Idaho Code §50-1002 requires the city council of each city in the State of Idaho to pass a budget, referred to as an annual appropriation ordinance; and, WHEREAS, Idaho Code §63-802 sets limitations on all taxing district budget requests on the amount of property tax revenues that can be used to fund programs and services; and, WHEREAS, Idaho Code §63-802(1)(f) requires that the City adopt an annual resolution to reserve additional forgone amount in order to utilize that amount in subsequent years; and, WHEREAS, the City has met the notice and hearing requirements in Idaho Code §63-802(1)(f) to reserve the current year's increase in the forgone amount; and, WHEREAS, the City intends to reserve \$2,850 of its current year's increase in allowable forgone amount. NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF UCON, IDAHO, that \$2,850 of the current year's allowable increase in its forgone amount is reserved and

ORDINANCE NO. 189 SALARIES OF ELECTED OFFICIALS AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING THE SALARIES OF ELECTED OFFICIALS, REPEALING CONFLICTING ORDINANCES AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF UCON, IDAHO:

Section 1: MAYOR AND COUNCIL: SALARIES: Commencing January 1, 2022 the salaries of the members of the Ucon City Council shall be as follows: (a) The Mayor of Ucon shall receive a monthly salary in the sum of six hundred (\$600.00) dollars; (b) Each member of the Council shall receive a monthly salary in the sum of three hundred (\$300.00) dollars. Section 2: REPEAL OF CONFLICTING PROVISIONS: All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict. Section 3: PUBLICATION AND EFFECTIVE DATE: This ordinance shall be effective January 1, 2022 following its publication as provided by law. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT OR-DAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF UCON, IDAHO. PASSED AND APPROVED by the Council and Mayor this 11th day of August 2021.
